


Souper Bowl of Caring

Are you ready for the "SOUPER" BOWL? Heritage Tweens are!

Sunday, February 11th is the NFL Football Super Bowl - - and Heritage will have our own S-O-U-P-E-R Bowl of Caring. The Souper Bowl of Caring is a grassroots, faith-based crusade against hunger. We are joining other churches, schools, and organizations across the country by collecting cans of soup and funds, that are donated to local food pantries. Last year, this movement nationally raised over \$10 million to fight hunger and poverty across the country.

At Heritage in 2023, we collected 1400 cans of soup for the Mason Food Panty and \$2,200 in monetary donations for the Comet Cupboard. Over the past 13 years, HPC has participated in Souper Bowl of Caring, and has been able to generously stock the shelves of our local food pantry for several months. With God's help, this year will be no exception.

Once again, this year our HPC 'Tweens will coordinate this mission to help feed the hungry. They will be collecting cans of high protein and chunky style soup throughout the month of January. Cans of soups will be collected in the Atrium. The 'Tweens will also be making the famous 'Tween Chili, to raise funds for SOUPER BOWL of CARING.

Matthew 25 reminds us with these words, "Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food...?" Jesus answers," Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of theses who are members of my family, you did it to me."

How Can I Donate to HPC and Reduce My Taxes?

One way to donate to HPC and reduce your taxes is you can make a direct donation of shares of stock or mutual funds to HPC and avoid capital gains taxes on the appreciated value of your shares.

Another way is persons over 70½ years of age can make a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) to donate up to \$100,000 to one or more charities directly from a taxable IRA instead of taking their Required Minimum Distribution (RMD). As a result, donors may avoid being pushed into higher income tax brackets and prevent phaseouts of other tax deductions.

Understanding Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs)

Understanding qualified charitable distributions begins with understanding required minimum distributions. People who hold Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs) are required to take RMDs each year beginning at age 73—even if they don't need or want the funds. That same required minimum distribution increases the IRA holder's total taxable income.

This income increase could potentially push the taxpayer into a higher income tax bracket. It can also trigger phaseouts, which limit or eliminate some kinds of tax deductions, such as personal exemption and itemized deductions, and sometimes trigger high taxes on Social Security income.

QCDs are also called IRA charitable distributions or IRA charitable rollovers. They enable individuals to fulfill their required minimum distribution by a direct transfer of up to \$100,000 to charity. They can also be used to support multiple charities, as long as the sum of the distributions is within the \$100,000 limit. But because QCDs don't increase taxable income, both higher tax rates and phaseouts can be avoided.

In addition, because QCDs reduce the balance of the IRA, they may reduce required minimum distributions in future years. QCDs are also not counted toward the maximum amounts deductible for those who itemize their giving on their taxes—the \$100,000 can be above and beyond those limits. For these reasons, a QCD can potentially enable a donor to give a bigger charitable gift than they could if they just donated cash or other assets.

Qualified charitable distributions are made directly to the eligible charity from a traditional IRA, inherited IRA, inactive Simplified Employee Pension (SEP) plan and inactive Savings Incentive Match Plan for Employees (SIMPLE) IRAs. (Inactive SEP and SIMPLE IRAs are accounts that no longer receive employer contributions.)

The money is a direct transfer to the charity that never passes through the hands of the IRA holder. Instead, the IRA custodian can either send an electronic transfer of funds or a check directly to the charity.

Donating to HPC

Heritage Presbyterian Church has two accounts set up to receive a direct donation of shares of stock or mutual fund OR a Qualified Charitable Distribution. One account is set up to receive regular stewardship giving; the other account is set up to receive contributions to the Legacy Capital Campaign. Particular thanks to Debbie Hamann and Ben Zumkehr, who spent dozens of hours over the last month, helping us to prepare.
- * 35 glorious singers from the Little Miami Choir directed by Sarah Baker.
- * 25 volunteers who helped set up, to transform our facilities into Bethlehem for the evening.
- * 21 Soup makers who provided delicious food for our guests.
- * A "flock" of 12 Shepherds who ably guided our guests from station to station, 4 additional hearty Shepherds, and 1 glorious singing angel who endured frigid temperatures for 3 hours.

Family Promise of Warren County Has Moved!

After two years of preparation, on Friday, 12-15-2023, the staff of Family Promise of Warren County (FPWC) moved to their new offices at 6000 Cincinnati Avenue (Route 42), in Lebanon. This new location is the old Shaker Inn. This was truly a wonderful day, in that it will allow all of us to improve our ministry to the homeless of Warren County; and to continue to respond to the grace of God. The guests will remain at the Knights Inn/Guest Inn in Lebanon until Sunday, 3-10-2024, when they will also move to the new facility.

Our "Ministry Model" for FPWC had to make a dramatic and emergency change on 3-22-2020 (almost four years ago). That is when the guests had to start staying in a hotel rather than come to churches like ours, as a result of the Covid pandemic. Now, we are still being asked to provide all the meals for the guests during in our support week in January 2024 and all future support weeks. But for March of 2024 and afterwards, we are being asked to make another dramatic shift to our FPWC Ministry Model. We are being asked to start providing Fellowship Hosts and Overnight Hosts similar what we did up thru January of 2020 (four years ago). Only now we are being asked to do this at the new FPWC facility instead of our own church. Training will be provided for Fellowship and Overnight Volunteers on upcoming Saturdays. I hope and pray that you will join me in continuing to support FPWC.

Great Year for Christmas Benevolences

One of the great joys for the Mission committee comes at year-end when we spend down remaining monies designated in our annual budget for our mission "partners." We call these end-the-year checks "Christmas benevolences". This year we had more to share with these organizations than ever before, because of our generous members.



Gifts you made during the year are sent on to these partners to cover activities and needs that come up. In fact, gifts designated for a particular mission organization often exceed what we have provided in the budget. The best example is Our Daily Bread – where gifts made by members nearly doubled the \$800 we had budgeted.

Altogether, about two-thirds of our budgeted support to mission partners was still available for benevolences. Thank you, Heritage members.




Community Cupboard
